NEPEAN GRADUATE NURSES AT FAIRFIELD HOSPITAL



If success can be measured by the display of enthusiasm, then Iris Elmer and Patricia Ryan have achieved it.

After years of planning, the College trained nurse is now a reality, with the associated problems dissolving rapidly. Iris and Patricia along with Barbara Alderton, Gertrude Krebs and others, completed their training at Nepean in 1987/88. Not only are they among the first nurses to be working in the community with a College Diploma, but their choice of workplace is as new as their position in it.

"Fairfield hospital was our choice" Iris said, "we had attended a Careers' Market day and something clicked. We were made to feel special and worthwhile and because we were aware of the resentment we may have evoked from hospital trained staff, Fairfield seemed the appropriate place to be."

As Iris and I walked through the new 214 bed facility at Prairewood, I was




Sister Iris Elmer, right, and Sister Nicolle Germano welcoming the first patient to the new Fairfield Hospital.


impressed by the pervading sense of familiarity emanating from all the hospital staff. We stopped to chat to the clerical aide, shared a joke with a doctor dressed in theatre whites and waved to a porter wheeling a smiling patient along the corridor. Iris chuckled at my surprise as

she explained, "we were taught from an Holistic viewpoint and that's what you see here, an emphasis on the whole person, physical, mental and emotional. Every member of staff is important, that's why it works so well, we're made to feel part of a team."

Iris confided to me that raising a family and studying had been difficult at times but "well worth the effort". Her mother had always wanted to be a nurse and had never been given the opportunity. "I have fond memories of Nepean and will always retain a sense of dedication to the College (soon to be University). I've had a hard life and it's like a reward. I now have the chance to make choices." Patricia, who graduated with Distinction, joined us at this point and emphasised the same aspects. "I've lived in Mt Druitt all my life, went to Shalvey High, on to Nepean CAE and now I'm working at Fairfield. I am extremely happy." It showed. I asked Patricia if she had considered further study and she agreed that "yes, paediatrics was appealing."

While sitting in the relaxing courtyard we were met by Barbara Alderton and Gertrude Krebs, very recent staff members at Fairfield. After catching up on the latest progress reports of an accident victim, I was introduced and again overwhelmed by the response. Comments such as, "great working conditions, ongoing staff education and happy cohesive team" focused in their description. "You could sum it up by saving that the most important aspect of our life here is the existent internal support system." A some-

what medical, though obviously valid comment from a group of very happy nurse graduates.

Having said goodbye, I walked to the carpark and pondered on the experience. Exhilaration was mixed with a slight feeling of having been cheated. I trained in a hospital many years ago and always felt that something was missing. Today at Fairfield, I found it. The nursing profession has come a long way.

Former Education student Brian Cluff has revealed, (while being scrutinised with an intense scrute by your correspondent), that he was once bet a round of golf by an unnamed lecturer. Like others we could mention Bernadette (now McCoy) McFadden, (What's this thing with Mcs?) began her course at Nepean because it was the only thing going at the time. She didn't mind the idea of teaching, her sister is a teacher, (and is also a product of Nepean), and she gets on well with children.



HAT TRICK - "ROLL OVER BEETHOVEN"

There were few jobs available when Bernadette left College, (looks like you'll have to start a band). Casual teaching was her only option, which she did until last year. Bernadette was lucky that she had an alternative career to fall back on, (you sound like you're her mum now).

Hat Trick is successful because the members of the band are aware of themselves as musicians and as artists, but also aware of their audience. They bring their music to the people. "You've got to put on a show. Present yourself. Work the crowd. You also have to run yourself like a business."

Hat Trick's success is even more remarkable when you consider that they have no radio airplay and are completely ignored by all the hip magazines and music newspapers. (I've never heard of them and I know all there is to know about the scene.)

I'm impressed by a tape I listen to later, (that's nice of you, didn't realise you were official music critic as well as official incompetent)..


The band has the ability to play solid rock/pop such as Gerry Rafferty's "Baker Street", but what is most impressive is their interpretations of classics, somewhat in the style of the widely acclaimed "Sky".

Bernadette believes that most people enjoy classical music if it is presented in a way which is accessible. "Give them a beat to move to and they'll be saying 'What's that? Yeah I know that!"

Hat Trick have recorded five albums, the latest, Beethoven Roll Over. They

play regular shows at the General Bourke Hotel, Parramatta, and The Great Northern, Chatswood. Support them, so Bernadette doesn't have to use her Diploma.

(That it eh? I know heaps of writers who could do better. Really, where did they get you from?)

PEOPLE LEARN WHAT THEY DO

Yes......well, here we go again companieros. What is it with Education and musicians? Pat Drummond is the second graduate of that School I've spoken to who is now a musician. (By the way it took me ages to get this interview, so you'd better like it.)

Pat Drummond graduated in 1975 from what was the Westmead Teachers College. Pat described to me an essentially alien environment. One where students, (other than Performing Arts), put on musicals, he took the lead in a couple of these. An environment where a variety of student clubs were encouraged and were popular. Pat was the coordinator of the Concert Club.

The idea of this Club was to arrange for musicians of standing to visit the campus and perform, (for example Don Burrows came once). This gave Pat invaluable experience in the murky business side of the music industry. His activities at the College were among his first experiences of performance and working in the music industry. It's unlikely that Pat would have the same opportunites to widen his horizons if he had been at the College (sorry - University) today. Demarcation disputes would have ensued, unfortunately the students enforce this rigidity as much as anyone else.

Pat has had no formal music training, he's one of these innately gifted people that I hate, he picked up the guitar at 15 and the seeds of later gigs were planted. While teaching infants at Lidcombe he was also performing three nights a week. A decision had to be made: glory, glamour and fame or ankle biters. Nuff said.

Pat was to find that his teacher training would emerge strongly in his attitude towards the audience and per-

forming. I've been told that Pat is "a little like a teacher. Getting the crowd involved and telling them to 'come on'."

Pat believes that "people learn what they do", he wants to wrest power from the stage and place it with the audience. Essentially he wants people to entertain themselves. He states that our celebrity musicians encourage "passive entertainment", which is partly a result of our "television culture."

Pat's latest album Live at the Rest Hotel (available on True Blue/CBS) gives a clear idea of his approach. His songs are written for the audience, the "entire crowd is the band" - songs such as "Who Owns the Ball", which takes the form of a scripted argument. People learn their part after attending a few of the shows or from Pat's albums, and

with a little effort they become part of the show. It's not just a singalong.

Pat states that this form of performance was very close to the punk philosophy which was based upon destruction of traditional audience/performer barriers. He believes that his work was "as close to the philosophy of punk that we got in Australia." This form of "accoustic punk" brought Pat a great deal of success.

Until last year Pat played a legendary Friday night residency at the Rest Hotel, Milsons Point. Pat's performances became a habit or ritual for many who kept coming back to play their part. Pat designed his show so that the more you knew the more fun you had, the fun was in being involved, being the 'stars'. Pat estimates that in this period of ten years

he has played before at least 100,000 people.

However the mainstream music industry feels that Pat doesn't project the necessary star image to be truly successful. This suits Pat, and fits in with his current project where he has adopted the role of travelling minstrel.

His shows are now based on the theme of: 'Tales of the Local Rag'. Pat explains that it began as a type of Bicentennial project. His aim was to "pick up stories and turn them into songs. Stories of average people, who are really the important people. Concentrating on the courageous victories in little people's lives, that are generally ignored. These people are often far more courageous than the celebrities who always get the attention".

Pat sounds okay to me, being a Frank Hardy admirer and a bit of a red-head myself.......Not that Pat is too, I don't know, we didn't talk about it, have mercy, I'm unemployed, I used to be a student, don't hit me with libel.......

AAAARRRRGGGGHHHHH



Sheila Tring interviews Diana Laybutt inside Malabar Training Centre

Earlier this year I was talking to Rae Luckie, the Alumni Development Officer, about some of the interesting and unusual jobs in which some of the Nepean College graduates have become involved. I was particularly interested to learn about a recent graduate from the School of Visual and Performing Arts, Diana Laybutt, who is now teaching drama and theatrecraft to some of the inmates of the Malabar Training Centre. Rae had been invited to a performance entitled FROM THE NICK at the Centre's theatre and her enthusiasm prompted me to arrange for tickets to see the next performance open to the public.

On a Monday evening in February a friend and I drove out along Anzac Parade to the theatre at the Malabar Training Centre, which is the minimum security of Long Bay Gaol. We were looking forward to seeing two plays written by Neil Carroll, one of the inmates.

The theatre was filled to capacity and as the curtain rose on the first


of the two plays there was a feeling of expectancy which one only seems to be aware of in live theatre. The plays - 'Miles From Nowhere' and 'Denise's News' deal with the problem of AIDS and high risk behaviour and its consequences in a prison environment. They were written to create awareness within the prison of the dangers of shared needles and intravenous

drugs and to promote the sterilisation of borrowed needles.

The second play, in which Diana appeared as the 'Denise' of the title, is stark in its portrayal of a prisoner who learns he has AIDS and must tell his wife when she visits her news is that she is pregnant.

In spite of the subject both these plays were very entertaining. Considering they were Neil's first serious attempt as a playwright, the message, because of its clarity and simplicity, came across to the audience in a way that other, more dramatic messages, fail to do.

Diana's direction of the plays lifted the production and gave it a professional polish; her teaching took the cast beyond the self-consciousness of the amateur. The enthusiasm of the cast and all those involved in the plays, came clearly across the footlights to the audience. Listening to the visitors comments at the end of the evening the overall impression was the audience loved it and would come back for more.



Scene from "Denise's News"




I asked Diana how she became involved with the Training Centre. She explained that she had been practising drama and movement on Coogee beach early one morning and had been approached by a member of the Drug and Alcohol team to teach drama at the prison. Teaching was a direction in her career which Diana had not considered and it is one she does not regret. She is very happy and enthusiastic about what she is doing. The program is now funded by the AIDS Education Department and there are plans to take the plays into other prisons in the state.

Diana would like to form a permanent Performing Drama group, have more public performances, and broaden the program to include such plays as 'The Last of the Knucklemen'. There could be a problem with funding - and with casting also, for often the prisoners are transferred at a moment's notice. Diana feels so strongly about the merit of this project that she will, I hope, overcome these difficulties.

Diana attributes much of her success with the project to the broad base of the Performing Arts program at Nepean College which is strong on theatrecraft. This, Diana says, has given her the practical knowledge and expertise to teach with confidence.

Shelia Tring will receive her BA (Communication) in May.

new graduate theatre company for University of Western Sydney, Nepean

The 1989 Australian premiere of "Footsteps To The Moon" will be performed by the newly created graduate theatre company of the University of Western Sydney, Nepean. Students and staff of the School of Visual and Performing Arts, University of Western Sydney, Nepean, are expecting their busiest year with a wide variety of productions scheduled. Mr Malcolm Keith, Senior Lecturer, Performing Arts, said "students from each year will be working hard to produce a range of professional plays including 'Marat', 'Abelard and Helouise', 'Top Girls' and 'A Man For All Seasons'. The highlight of the year will be the musical,

'Footsteps To The Moon', performed at Bay Street Theatre, Sydney, commencing 2 August, 1989, by our graduate theatre company, as yet unnamed ", he said. The formation of the theatre company is the culmination of three years of planning for Mr Keith, who felt the need to establish a professional theatre company in Sydney's West. "The Western Suburbs is in need of a professional theatre company and our graduates have the talent and skills to provide it", he added.

"It is fitting that in its first year our graduate theatre company will perform the Australian premiere of 'Footsteps to the Moon', a musical centred around a holocaust and spanning the world between dreams and reality," he said. Mr Keith viewed "Footsteps To The Moon" at the 1988 Edinburgh Festival, and was so impressed he bought the Australian rights. The musical is to be underwritten by the University of Western Sydney, Nepean and if sponsorship can be secured it is expected that the musical will tour Australia with its graduate cast.


Dean of the School of Business, Dr Leonie Still, said the project is in line with the Government's initiatives to bring tertiary institutions and business and industry together, and the school is very excited. "Both Westpac and Nepean believe this is the start of a long term relationship between the two institutions with other similar courses being held in the future," Dr Still said. When approached by Westpac to train some of their better performing managers, Nepean was found to be the only institution flexible enough to meet the bank's needs.

The modified course is based on subjects from existing graduate diploma courses at Nepean.

The Westpac course includes studies in psychology, management and organisation, marketing, and employee relations.

The managers undertake training

at Westpac premises one night a week with some modular periods including some Saturday sessions. The course will run for a total of 14 weeks. On successful completion of the course participants will receive a "Westpac Management Diploma".

Accounting News

Graduates will no doubt recall press items about the resources devoted to the Accounting major. Enquiries to the Alumni office were referred to Dr. Robertson, who was Acting Dean of Business at the time the press items were circulating. Representatives of both Accounting professional bodies visited the campus on 23 March to discuss the new staff appointments and the new computer laboratory. Both professional bodies are totally satisfied with Nepean's action and a press release to this effect will be issued to newspapers. At no time was the accreditation of the accounting course under threat.

Developments

The School of Business is commencing work on a MBA and a MCom. Both programs are intended for introduction in 1991.

New majors are also proposed for the Bachelor of Business degree. It is intended to offer an Economics major at Westmead and a Management major at Kingswood.

Overseas Students

41 overseas students are currently enrolled in the School's programs. 26 are commencing students in the Bachelor of Business, 10 are continuing in this program and 5 are enrolled in the Graduate Diploma (Business Computing).


Master of Business (Taxation)

SUMMER SCHOOL '88

Four enthusiastic graduates of Nepean, all who have completed BA (Visual Arts) and Diploma in Education courses ran a highly successful Summer School in Art for high school students at Kingswood campus in January. Students are therefore able to make a more educated career choice, having actually experienced some of the demands of College life. We treat them like artists rather than high school students, and they have to learn to understand the particular language used in the arts - they also get their hands dirty!"


Ann Foster believes that the course provided a great opportunity for the students to work in a studio environment for two weeks. "The kind of work they are producing is indicative of the freedom they have in the studio and it has been a great experience nurturing the students' artistic abilities. Their capabilities and potential have really amazed me."

Italia laconis said she was honoured and excited to be able to take part in lecturing at the Summer School. "It enabled me to see a different side to the type of teaching usually carried out in a high school situation, working with the students here has been at such a high level that it has inspired me to do more of my own work. Many of the students were only interested in painting when they first came here, and it was interesting during a trip to the art gallery to see and discuss their reaction to the variety of works there."

Rod Stephenson found the work incredibly exciting and also somewhat tiring. "The standard of the work being produced is excellent. The students want to be here and work incredibly hard, and we push them to their limits. We are also aiming to them with 'low technology' portable skills they can take back and use at school. We realise a school may not have many of the advanced forms of technological equipment available here, so we also show them simplified methods of work.

After speaking with the four lecturers, it was great to speak with the students, some literally up to their elbows in plaster! Interest, enthusiasm and dedication showed in the works being created in the studios.

Judith Mullins is in year 12 at Evans High, Blacktown, and hopes to complete a Bachelor of Education course in art education. After experimenting with various mediums at the summer school she decided to work in clay. Judith was really enthusiastic about the school. "It provides a perfect opportunity for anyone intending to go to College, providing an insight into what College life is really like."




ABORIGINALITY IN THE WEST


THE ONE EXTRA COMPANY ON CAMPUS

Members of "The One Extra Company", one of Australia's most innovative dance-theatre groups have been working with students in the Dance and Theatre programs at the University of Western Sydney, Nepean.

In keeping with the university philosophy of inviting companies for short term residences, Kai Tai Chan and The One Extra Company presented classes, workshops and rehearsals over a two-week period in March to first, second and final year students of Nepean Dance.

Kai Tai challenged the students with a frank outlook on dance. His approach was confronting to students. However, with communications working both ways, it was a learning process for all.

Emphasis was placed on process and an inner understanding of movement rather than a final product. Tasks were set to develop movements through an exploration of the processes.



Application of these principles was used to learn excerpts from the Company's repertoire which culminated in a showing to students and staff on the final day of the two week project.


Kai Tai Chan and The One Extra Company offered an alternative approach to the traditional ideals held by many in the dance field and they gave third year students something to think about.

SCIENCE WORKING FOR A CLEANER RIVER

Concentrating is nothing new to Gerald Farnell. As a science student he did his share of it. But over December 1988 to February 1989 he did more than usual. He was working under the supervision of Dr. Sam Adeloju, Research Director for CIRAT* in the analytical instrumentation laboratories concentrating water samples as part of a new and unique testing procedure to ascertain levels of pesticides and other pollutants in watercourses. When developed, the tests will enable much quicker and more adequate testing than presently possible.

Gerald has been able to work on the project as the result of a Summer Vacation Research Scholarship awarded for the first time in Nepean College at the end of 1988. The project, initiated by CIRAT is good news for the Nepean River. "These

tests will be really important for the river which is already showing signs of pollution. Carp, a bottom-feeding fish more tolerant of contaminated water than Bass or Trout, are now the most prolific species of fish found in the Nepean."

The work isn't finished even though Gerald's scholarship ended in late February. His documented results will be used by Dr. Adeloju and some CIRAT staff in the continuing work to develop the tests. Gerald is confident that there will be a tremendous interest in them from government, private enterprise and the community at large.

The work he did during the period of his scholarship was closely linked to a subject called 'environmental chemistry' in the Applied Chemistry course at Nepean. Gerald started at

Nepean in 1987 when he immigrated from Ireland. He had begun a science degree there and looked around N.S.W. tertiary institutions for a similar course where he could continue his studies. He found it at Nepean. "I couldn't believe it. The Nepean course had the same mix of science and business subjects as the course in Ireland. It was almost identical."

Gerald is one of four graduands of the Bachelor of Applied Science degree course in Applied Chemistry at Nepean. He believes that the combination of science and business subjects in their course seems to be what employers are looking for. "People with the knowledge of science, but who also know what's going on in the business world. We've had no trouble getting jobs in our field." Gerald is now employed at Proctor and Gamble as an Industrial Chemist.

NEPĒAN COUNCIL BRIEFS

GRADUATION

At a meeting late last year, Council discussed a student petition requesting that those completing studies in 1988 by graduated as students of the University of Western Sydney. Council indicated that it would consider the matter at a later meeting. Since then legislation has been passed that clearly indicates that such students should graduate from the Nepean College of Advanced Education. At its last meeting Council decided that it could not meet the request of the students as the legislation, and the Heads of Agreement, were so explicit in their instruction.

FEES FOR POST-GRADUATE COURSES

At its last meeting the Nepean College Council approved a proposal to levy fees for post-graduate courses at \$1800 per EFTSU in 1989, subject to a review each year. Late last year the Commonwealth Government authorised institutions to charge fees for certain post-graduate courses.

Students who pay the fee will not be liable for the HECS charge. Institutions will retain the fee and continue to count the students as part of funded load.

Courses for which the fees will be charged in 1989 are:

GradDip in Educational Studies (Special Education), GradDip in Educational Studies (Educational Administration), GradDip in Educational Computing *, GradDip in School Counselling, Master of Education, GradDip in Employee Relations, GradDip in Business Computing, GradDip in Taxation **.






