BRIEF HISTORY OF THE MACARTHUR INSTITUTE OF HIGHER EDUCATION

The Macarthur Institute of Higher Education had its background in the former Milperra College of Advanced Education. The Milperra College with Dr. I. C. Smith as its Foundation Principal, enrolled its first students in the Spring of 1975. The first permanent buildings at the Milperra Campus were opened by the then Premier of N.S.W., the Hon. N. K. Wran, Q.C., M.P., on 20th March, 1978. In 1982, the Milperra College of Advanced Education established its presence in Campbelltown by leasing a wing of the Franciscan Monastery, "Maryfields" for temporary use as a Centre for Business Studies. Classes began at Maryfields in 1983.

As a result of a joint Commonwealth and State Government initiative, on 1st July, 1983, the Milperra College of Advanced Education was replaced by the Macarthur Institute of Higher Education. With campuses strategically placed at Campbelltown and Milperra, Macarthur Institute was to provide a broader range of higher education courses to the South Western suburbs of Sydney including the local government areas of Bankstown, Fairfield, Liverpool, Campbelltown, Camden, Wollondilly and suburbs on the periphery of these areas. At that time, South Western Sydney had by far the least number of higher education places in relation to its population of any comparable metropolitan region in Australia.

Work began in 1983 on the planning and construction of the Institute's Campbelltown Campus which is set on a 158 hectare site.

The Macarthur Institute Council, under the Founding Chairman, Dr. Joyce Wylie, O.B.E., developed appropriate structures to accommodate the sudden growth and diversification of courses. On 1st July, 1984, the Schools of Arts & General Studies, Business & Technology, Community & Welfare Studies, Education & Language Studies, and Nursing were established.

Macarthur Institute has become one of the most rapidly developing higher education institutions in Australia. It has grown from around 800 students in 10 courses in 1983 to around 3,100 students in 23 courses in 1987. A substantial part of this growth was due to a N.S.W. Government decision to transfer all Nurse Education to Colleges of Advanced Education from the beginning of 1985.

The first lectures at the new Campbelltown Campus were given in May 1986 when the first part of the Stage I buildings became available. The Central Administration of the Institute moved to the Campbelltown Campus in November 1987 when the first building in the Stage II complex was completed. The remaining buildings of the Stage II development at Campbelltown are expected to be completed by the beginning of lectures in 1988 when the Institute is required to relinquish its lease on the Maryfields Monastery. At that stage, all the accommodation on both the Milperra and Campbelltown campuses will have virtually reached capacity.
