CONFERENCES AND PRESENTATIONS

HEALTH CARE IN SECURE SETTINGS CONFERENCE, SYDNEY, JUNE 2022

Penny attended this conference attended by healthcare providers interested in promoting quality healthcare for people in custody. There were great presentations from speakers from Australia and New Zealand, including on ways to promote health and wellbeing while working within the many constraints of our patients' situations. The importance of quality primary care both inside and outside prison cannot be overstated given the high burden of poor health and previous trauma and disadvantage in this population.

INTERNATIONAL FORUM ON QUALITY AND SAFETY IN HEALTHCARE, SYDNEY JULY 2022

In a first for a number of years Jenny attended this face to face conference at Darling Harbour in July. Whilst most of the presentations were focussed on hospital care, it was inspiring to hear about health systems such as those in the United Kingdom and New Zealand that demonstrated how primary and secondary/ tertiary healthcare sectors worked together effectively during the Covid pandemic. Many of the lessons on quality improvement processes are relevant in general practice especially as we work towards better integrating our healthcare systems in Australia.

GP SUPERVISOR AWARDS

One of our long-standing GP Supervisors in Western Sydney, Dr Kean-Seng Lim, was awarded the 2022 AMA Excellence in Healthcare award at the recent AMA National Conference. This award recognises "an AMA member who has made an outstanding contribution to leadership and advocacy in the delivery of high standard health care". Dr Lim is the co-founder and clinical lead of CareMonitor. This is a shared care, real-time remote monitoring and population health management platform which also has telehealth capability. CareMonitor has been used during the COVID pandemic to monitor patients, including as part of the COVID Kids program, led by WentWest and the Children's Hospital at Westmead during the Delta outbreak in NSW in 2021.

Congratulations to Dr Lim – how wonderful for our students to learn their general practice skills in such an innovative environment!

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN SUPERVISING MEDICAL STUDENTS IN YOUR PRACTICE?

Many GPs find having a medical student in their practice is both interesting and rewarding. There are opportunities for mutual learning and to pass on their skills and experience to the next generation of medical practitioners. Patients also enjoy the opportunity to contribute to the learning of a future health professional. The School of Medicine at Western Sydney University provides a GP placement for students in Year 1 (eight sessions in second semester), Year 3 (2 days per week over five weeks) and Year 5 (3 days per week for five weeks). With Year 1 placements requiring only two sessions (one day) per month, we encourage our GP Supervisors to take these students in addition to our Year 3 and 5 students!

Findings from a survey of our graduates who are now GPs or GP registrars mention the key role of highly-regarded supervisors during their GP placement that influenced them towards this career pathway. PIP payments for student teaching is available for accredited practices. STUDENT NEWS FROM LISMORE (Natalie Lindsay and Meera Vasanthanathan)

The effects of the catastrophic flooding in the Northern Rivers continues to impact many communities within our region. Last week the Northern Rivers Doctor Network hosted a 'FloodDocs Recovery' event where seven local health professionals presented their personal stories from the recent floods. It was interesting listening to the stories of devastation and the prolonged process of recovery. It was great to hear a few mentions of the assistance provided by the Western Sydney medical students at the evacuation centre during this unprecedented event – it certainly was a GP term not to forget! Below is a reflection from one of our students Meera Vasanthanathan, on her time assisting at the evacuation centre during her general practice term.

As medical students volunteering at evacuation centres during the time of Lismore Floods, like many others, we hoped to help with the coordination of the medical centre at the facility. Although we were initially sceptical of our limitations as 'just students', these days at the evacuation centres forced us to think more broadly about the challenges of disaster medicine.

Looking back, a highlight of our time at the centre were the moments we would return home from a shift and discuss amongst ourselves about our day and the patients we saw. It was like an informal handover that gave us the opportunity to debrief about overwhelming moments and helped keep us grounded. Together we helped develop a direct dosing system that constantly adapted to the growing needs of the patients at the evacuation centre. However, these nightly recaps of our day were what made it easy to stay up to date for our next shift.

It's hard to forget that feeling of solace during those days at the centre. The 'pet room' featured a wide variety of beloved animals who were displaced from their homes and had to learn to live with each other. One might expect the natural chaos that occurs when dogs, cats and birds co-exist, however this was not the case. Thanks to the volunteer veterinarians the animals were settled and well-supported. Our time during the Lismore floods was an incredibly confronting experience and the consequences of these floods are still being felt heavily. The moments spent at the SCU evacuation centre will stay with us as a reminder of a community that has experienced unbelievable loss and has survived.

We are incredibly proud of the students for stepping forward and assisting during the community's time of need. Your assistance in the community was much appreciated!

Our new cohort of students from WSU have arrived and settled into their new region and clinical terms.

Apart from some unfortunate contact with COVID, the term has proceeded well. Up here we are aware that the community is well and truly done with COVID. But COVID appears not yet to be done with us!

Fortunately for us, on the other hand, the rain has moved to other parts of the state for now.

Our campus seems to be brimming with medical students from our three universities (USYD and UOW as well as WSU), as well as allied health students from a variety of others, all making the most of the learning opportunities provided.

This year we have welcomed a new Senior Lecturer to the General Practice Unit, Dr Rosie Hamilton, who brings with her an interest in research as well as a natural aptitude and passion for teaching. Together with Drs Natalie Lindsay and Dave Glendinning, we now have a mostly young (yours truly excluded) and dynamic team, which bodes well for the future of GP training in this region.

STUDENT RESEARCH

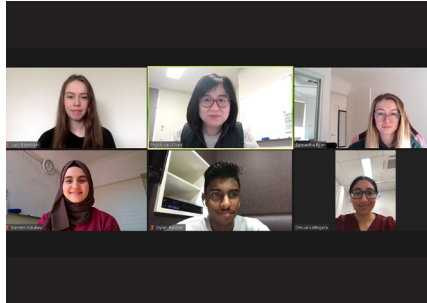
Quest PHC Student researchers

Dhruvi Lathigara was awarded the Summer Scholarship to work on QUEST PHC from December 2021 to February 2022. Dhruvi assisted the team to complete its systematic review of patient-reported measures (PRMs), data extraction for literature review of indicators used in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Justice Health sectors, and preliminary quantitative analysis of the Delphi rounds 1 and 2 surveys to establish consensus of the QUEST PHC indicators amongst practice and industry experts. Even though Dhruvi has now completed her summer scholarship placement, she has returned to assist the QUEST team to analyse the Delphi qualitative data and will be co-presenting with the team at the upcoming Australasian Association for Academic Primary Care (AAAPC) Annual Research Conference in August 2022.

Both **Lucy Bannister** and **Baneen Alrubayi** have been awarded the Jayadev Scholarships to work with the QUEST PHC team in 2022. They are currently assisting the team to conduct a full analysis of the Delphi rounds 1,2 and 3 survey data, compiling of a compendium of PRMs reviewed and will assist with the conduct and qualitative analysis of up to 4 focus groups with consumers and stakeholders. The two students will also be co-presenting with the team at the upcoming AAAPC conference in August 2022.

Meet Lucy Bannister

I am Lucy Bannister, a 3rd year MD student at Western Sydney University working on the QUEST PHC project as a recipient of the Jayadev Scholarship. I was excited to be involved in the project after discovering a passion for patient care through my general practice placements and clinical medicine tutorials. The project has encouraged me to pursue research as I have witnessed the potential of research to create positive change for patients and the broader health care system. It has also allowed me to reflect on what I can do as a future health professional to provide effective, high-quality care and improve the patient experience. The supportive and productive team environment provided by Dr Phyllis Lau and Samantha Ryan has equipped me with valuable skills for my future in general practice and medical research. I have thoroughly enjoyed working with the QUEST PHC team thus far and am extremely grateful to have been given the opportunity.

Meet Baneen Alrubayi

I am Baneen Alrubayi, a 4th year MD student and have been fortunate enough to work with Dr Phyllis Lau, Samantha Ryan, and Lucy Bannister as part of the QUEST PHC project through the Jayadev Scholarship. As a student who aspires to become a Rural Generalist with advanced skills in Obstetrics, learning about patient Reported Measures (PRMs) and their potential to be used as a way to provide direct, timely feedback about a patient's health-related experiences has been very fascinating and I believe the PRM compendium has the potential to be used to drive improvements in primary healthcare across Australia. Furthermore, the collaborative and supportive nature of the QUEST PHC team has allowed me to develop a vast array of research skills and knowledge and encouraged me to continue pursuing a career in general practice. I am very grateful for the opportunity to work and contribute to QUEST PHC's work and look forward to the rest of my involvement!

Dylan Pakkiam and **Jack Sun** are MD students allocated QUEST PHC as their MD project in 2022. Each will work with us for 5 weeks between July and September. They will assist with the full analysis of the Delphi surveys and the qualitative analysis of the focus groups with stakeholders.

OTHER STUDENT RESEARCH

Astha Malik has completed her investigation of the Western Sydney Integrated Care Program interview data (sub-analysis) for her project: Understanding the factors that influence Australian general practices to participate in an integrated care approach: A thematic analysis. She has been invited to present this research at GP22. She is currently refining the thematic analysis for her MBBS Honours dissertation and potentially a publication.

Emily Woods is undertaking her MD project with Justice Health & Forensic Mental Health Network. Her project involves surveying people with opioid use disorders in prison as to their experiences of release and whether they have been able to access the treatment they need inside and outside prison. This will be used by the Network to improve their Drug & Alcohol service delivery. It is nice to see that Emily is being supervised by **Dr Dena Attala**, who spent a year with us as an academic GP Registrar in 2016.

GP STUDENT NETWORK ACTIVITIES (Amanda Gonzalez Pegorer - Year 5)

In 2022, WSU GPSN held an orientation session for Year 1 medical students, which included giving information on the work of GPs, advertising our Facebook page to stay up to date with events, giving out merchandise, and teaching them blood pressure measurement, auscultation skills and reflex eliciting techniques with a tendon hammer.

We had participated in GP First Steps, a state-wide event in which the WSU GPSN team very proudly ran the otoscopy and ophthalmology workshops. Some of our team members also assisted with running the suturing workshop with other students and GP registrars. WSU GPSN also organised a Clinical Skills Night in conjunction with RHWUS, which included airway management, suturing and use of ophthalmoscopes and otoscopes. In September, WSU GPSN is planning on holding an online careers night, as many of our students are spread across NSW. We have many students attending our events and participating. We hope to continue seeing this level of enthusiasm in the future.

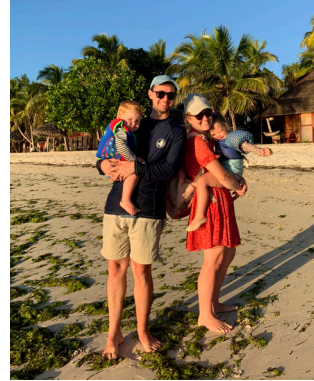

ALUMNI SURVEY RESULTS (Yasin Shahab)

We are always excited to hear where our graduates end up in the world of General Practice. Recently we sent out the third WSU GP alumni survey to document their training pathways, and we have so far received a total of 32 responses. Most respondents were from the Class of 2015 (n=7), with respondents coming from most of the other year groups.

Of the total respondents, 9 graduates (29%) had completed placements at either of our Rural Clinical Schools at Bathurst and Lismore, and 23 (74.2%) graduates reported that they had worked in rural areas since graduating. After graduation, all of the respondents had completed their internship in hospitals in Inner Sydney, south west Sydney and western Sydney. Nine respondents (29%) have worked at or are currently working with an Aboriginal Medical Service or Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Service.

We are proud to see that 27 (84.38%) of these respondents have completed their Fellowship with the RACGP, two of whom have also completed their FARGP. After completing their fellowships, nine alumni (29%) have continued working in areas in Greater Western Sydney.

A number of alumni recalled positive GP role models as an inspiration during their stay in medical school. A majority of the respondents reported that their decision to become a GP was influenced either somewhat or heavily by their GP experience in medical school.

Deepa Mahananda: Sydney Low Carb Specialists turns Three

It has always been a medical school dream of mine to create a clinic dedicated to preventative medicine and metabolic health. I'm happy to share that 3 years ago I took the plunge to open a practice, Sydney Low Carb Specialists (SLCS), in Castle Hill. This is a sub-specialty clinic that I co-direct with my husband and fellow GP, Dr Alex Petrushevski. It incorporates our special interest of using evidence based nutritional approaches, including carbohydrate restriction, as a powerful therapeutic option by itself or adjunct to traditional pharmacotherapy.

SLCS has assisted over 900 patients to date by utilising a 'slow medicine' approach towards consultations. Our consultations allow time to identify root causes/s of disease through a comprehensive history, examination, patient education and formulation of individualised management plans. We are fortunate to work alongside 2 experienced Accredited Practising Dietitians - Natasha Fayle and Kate Oetsch - as well as a highly dedicated administrative team led by Naomi Taylor. The dietitians guide patients on the practical implementation of a low carb dietary approach whilst also accommodating dietary preferences and fitting within a patients' lifestyle and food budget.

The burgeoning evidence for low carbohydrate diets means that our clinic is at the forefront of translating this science into clinical practice. I am immensely proud of our clinic as it is a culmination of our combined years of further education and research into this fascinating area of medicine.

- Dr Vivianne Xia is conducting research into the “Influence of alcohol use on intentional medication non-adherence in people with chronic disease”
- Dr Cecilia Lee’s research focus is “To better understand the characteristics and impact of consulting in languages other than English on registrars during general practice training”.

QUALITY EQUITY AND SYSTEMS TRANSFORMATION IN PRIMARY HEALTH CARE (QUEST PHC)

The QUEST PHC project team recently completed a Delphi study to establish consensus on indicators of high-quality general practice with general practice experts including GPs, practice nurses and primary health network staff. Focus groups were also conducted to explore consumers’ views on existing patient-reported measures that may be suitable for measuring some of these indicators. Further consultations are planned with stakeholders to explore the broader implementation of the QUEST PHC indicators in Australian general practice.

THE EXPERIENCE OF PRIMARY HEALTH NETWORKS DURING THE 2021 COVID-19 OUTBREAK – CHALLENGES AND LEARNINGS

The department has just concluded a research project with the 10 NSW PHNs to evaluate the primary care support they provided during COVID-19. This research comprised a scoping literature review, a review of documents provided by the PHNs, in depth interviews with 21 PHN staff (strategic and operational), a survey with primary care providers, and a focus group with the CEOs of the 10 PHNs. The report draft is currently being reviewed by the PHNs and a publication is forthcoming.
