Our students also have shone and thanks to the generosity of donors, Dr Anna Pham, Wollondilly Shire Council and Primary Health Care, three students were awarded GP prizes this year. UWS GPSN students have enthusiastically promoted General Practice as a career, organising a suite of student events this year.

We aim always to improve our teaching and so will be introducing mentoring for Year 3

students in 2012. We are keen to hear from readers interested in this opportunity and will be emailing details in the new year. We have also revised our PiP processes in Year 3 to align with those in Year 5—see page 3 for more information.

In the past few months we have been delighted to receive two substantial new research grants which will enable us to address key GP teaching and clinical questions related to Aboriginal health.

We will be leading a \$1.64m NHMRC Project grant investigating best management of acute otitis media in urban Aboriginal children, a population for which there is little evidence to inform practice. A successful tender to Australian General Practice Training will also enable us to better understand roles of Cultural Educators and Mentors in GP training.

Meanwhile Ron, Penny and Lawrence are leading a range of other research projects some of which you will find described in this newsletter.

Thank you once again for your generous support. Without our wider team these achievements would not have been possible.

2012 RACGP GENERAL PRACTITIONER OF THE YEAR AND NSW PRACTICE OF THE YEAR

We know at UWS that we have the BEST GP Supervisors and teaching General Practices and this was confirmed at GP12, the 2012 annual RACGP convention.

FIVE MINUTES WITH DR ROSS WILSON

Dr Ross Wilson is a rural GP with over 30 years of medical experience. Dr Wilson is recognised as one of the finest amongst his profession, being named Australian GP of the year by the RACGP back in 2003 whilst also working as a medical educator overseeing GP registrars. Dr Wilson who has been supervising UWS students for the past 2 1/2 years, talked with Dr Lawrence Tan about his time as a GP.

Ross, how did you first become involved in rural general practice?

It's something I was always going to do. When I was a student I spent some time with a rural GP who was also an orthopaedic surgeon in Kyogle. He took over his father's practice and showed me how it could be a great life. When I was let out of University, I went to Royal North Shore. I did two terms in Casualty because I thought it was

important, worked on the professorial surgical unit, then did an ENT/eye term, where I learnt to do tonsillectomies. This was followed by a term in general/ chest medicine. They were just starting a GP stream then and asked me to join, but I was already committed to doing obstetrics in Scotland. I also did anaesthetics in Surrey. I was going to join a practice in the United Kingdom but got talked out of it and went to try rural general practice in Australia. I was a senior resident at Orange Base hospital and was asked to join a practice there, where I stayed for 2 years. However, I could see procedural general practice was to become limited because of all the specialists moving in, so I went to work in Corowa in a 4-man group practice for 10 years. After that, my kids were wanting to do something other than farming and metal work so we moved to Bathurst where there were more facilities for their education. So I've been doing procedural general practice there for over 20 years now, which is 37 years in general practice altogether. I also did a Diploma of Community Child Health in the UK when my wife was doing neonatal ICU there. I did a Diploma of Child Health by correspondence, became a lactation consultant, and did various emergency courses including EMS, ALS, APLS, pre-hospital emergency care, and a Care Flight course.

Is there anything you dislike about General Practice? Anything that irritates or discourages you?

No, not really. Well, maybe the government interference, and the paperwork.

So what keeps you going in General Practice?

The people. And the challenge. You can never be too clever.

How do you see the future of General Practice?

It will always be what people make of it. You have to remember to be flexible, keep interested, and keep learning. There will always be a niche, a place for you and what you're interested in. General practice will need to adapt to an ageing population and the complex care that involves, but that needn't be your main focus. You could have a paediatric focus, you can always do what you like—that's the beauty of General Practice. No-one's going to stop you. There's a collegial spirit about General Practice.

Do you have a word for our readers?

Celebrate what's diverse about General Practice. Admire those who walk to a different drum. I applaud other GPs who are interested in women's health, psychological aspects, palliative care. Those are parts of my practice but not my cup of tea. I admire those who do it and love it.

AUSTRALIAN HEALTH INFORMATICS SUMMER SCHOOL

These short courses are aimed at clinical professionals such as doctors and


nurses, healthcare administrators and support personnel.

GP 12 PRESENTATIONS

The group used a qualitative study design to describe the perspectives and experiences of GPs providing antenatal shared care in Greater Western Sydney. The study was conducted in collaboration with Professor Virginia Schmied (UWS) and will help contribute towards the national Child Health Researching Universal Services (CHoRUS) study: *A Study Investigating the Feasibility of Implementing a National Approach to Child and Family Health Services*.

Dr Michael Burke along with students Hannah Hu, Shivani Patel, Kogulan Sriranjjan, Daniel Yang and Andrew Melito presented a poster during GP12. The poster titled *Review of the Understanding and Utilisation of Care Plans*, was well received by those attending GP12.

UWS STUDENTS WIN GP SYNERGY SCHOLARSHIPS

Students will complete an online scientific program and attend a regional specialist Immunology Clinic, over a period of two years, on a part-time basis.


