

The National Institute of Complementary Medicine at Western Sydney University in partnership with the Beijing University of Chinese Medicine is hosting a day of continuing professional development for GPs, medical specialists and interested allied health professionals on Chinese medicine.

In 2012 Australia became the first western country to recognise and regulate by law the practice of Chinese medicine in a similar way to other health professions. Both acupuncture and Chinese medicine consultations are reimbursable by most private health funds. Both are growing in popularity and many of us and our patients use some form of complementary medicine. However, for what conditions are acupuncture or Chinese herbal medicine appropriate? What existing evidence is there? How do we identify suitable practitioners to work with? How can you be sure about the quality of herbal medicines? How can we provide better advice or direction to our patients?

This continuing professional development workshop is aimed at promoting greater awareness of the potential use and regulatory context for Chinese medicine in Australia.

You will develop a better understanding of:

- Chinese medicine and acupuncture, and when might they be appropriate to use;
- How to evaluate clinical evidence and make practical decisions about patient care;
- How herbal medicines are regulated, how to find good practitioners;
- How to access reliable information about what works. AND MORE....
