3.10.1 Academic Policy Advisory Group (APAG)

An update on the academic policies prioritised for consideration and progress to date by the Academic Policy Advisory Group (APAG) is listed below.

Policy	Status
<i>Advanced Standing Policy</i>	The revised version approved by Academic Senate on 21 October 2016 has been published. The Student Experience Office (SEO) is proposing an implementation plan to the 24 May APAG meeting.
<i>Articulation Pathways Policy</i>	The 26 October 2016 APAG meeting discussed a proposed new version of the <i>Articulations Policy and Procedures</i> . This version was further amended to align with the new Partnerships and Pathways Framework and was discussed at the 16 February meeting of APAG. Further consultation with SACs and via the DDS will now occur.

<i>Assessment Policy</i>	Part of the implementation of the new <i>Disruption to Studies Policy</i> required an amendment to the <i>Guidelines for Academic Staff – Student Unable to Attend a Compulsory Unit Component</i> , revised guidelines are at item 3.10.2 for consideration. Minor amendments to the definition of ‘N’ Grade in the <i>Assessment Policy</i> to remove “academic” before misconduct in Part D, Temporary Grades were agreed to clarify for Schools and improve consistent application. These are included for consideration of Academic Senate at item 3.10.3.
<i>Courses and Units Approvals Policy</i>	The minor amendment to include the link to the revised <i>External Advisory Committee Procedures</i> into the <i>Courses and Units Approval Policy</i> was supported and endorsed by APCAC and Education Committee. An amendment to the delegation for approval of an additional location (A2.9) to a course offering was also agreed and endorsed by APCAC and Education Committee. These amendments are included for consideration of Senate at item 3.10.4.
<i>Course Design Policy</i>	The Terms of Reference and membership for the Working Party have been agreed noting that this work will be heavily influenced by the <i>TWSU</i> curriculum transformation project. Some difference of opinion has been noted at APCAC regarding the compliant volume of work for Graduate Certificates. Amendments to the <i>Postgraduate Coursework Policy</i> will be investigated by OQP for any necessary compliance updates.
<i>Disruption to Studies Policy (renamed from Special Consideration Policy)</i>	The new <i>Disruption to Studies Policy</i> and associated guidelines were approved at the 21 October 2016 meeting of Academic Senate. An implementation plan is being devised which may involve alignment of some other processes.
<i>Progression and Unsatisfactory Academic Progress</i>	A revised <i>Progression Policy</i> was agreed at the 16 February meeting of APAG and endorsed at the 7 March meeting of Education Committee. Further consultation with SACs and via the DDS will now occur.
<i>Special Consideration Policy - Deferred Exams Procedures</i>	Deferred Exam Procedures were agreed, following SAC consultation, linked to the Procedures to the <i>Examinations Policy</i> and removed from the current <i>Special Consideration Policy</i> . These were approved by Education Committee at the 7 March meeting and are included for consideration by Senate at item 3.10.5.
