Early learning educators also play a key role in developing fundamental movement skills and healthy eating habits through the fun play-based Munch & Move program that supports the healthy development of 0-5 year-old children.

She has experience in communicable diseases, outbreak management in childcare and residential aged care settings, infection control and respiratory nursing. 
